TWO -YEAR TERMS

Philip Costanzo joined the Duke Faculty in 1968 and is currently a Professor in the Department of Psychology and Neuroscience. He has served in numerous administrative and scientific leadership roles at Duke and nationally. These include: Chair of the Department of Psychology; Social and Health Sciences for 9 years (1991-1999) as well as Director of three of its graduate programs (Clinical, Developmental and Social Psychology) for varying tenures from 1975-1991; a member of the Arts and Sciences Council for 2 years and Chair of its Undergraduate Teaching, Academic Standards and Honors Committee ; on the Executive Committee of the Graduate Faculty for 4 years (2005-2009) and Chair of that committee from 2007-2009; on the advisory boards of the Kenan Institute , the Social Science Research Institute , the Center for Child and Family Policy and the Global Health Certificate Program . He is currently Chair of the Kenan Institute of Ethics Faculty Council ; Associate Director of The Center for Child and Family Policy ; Director of Duke's Spencer Foundation supported Discipline Based Scholarship in Education Graduate Training Program , and Principal Investigator and Director of Duke's NIDA supported Transdisciplinary Prevention Research Center(2003-2012) . Nationally he has served on multiple NIH and NSF peer review committees from 1979 to the present. He chaired the National Institute of Health's Human Development(HUD 1) Peer Review committee from 1983-1989.He has also served on the National Institute of Drug Abuse Centers Review Committee from 2001-the present , and has been Chair of that committee since 2003. He served as the Scientific Monitor for the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute's National Growth and Health Study from 1988-1998. He served on the NSF Social and Developmental Science Review Committee from 1989-1994.He has had multiple editorial roles on journals in several domains of the Behavioral Sciences and was the editor of the Journal of Personality for 10 years (1973-1982). In 2006, he was awarded Duke's Scholar/Teacher of the Year Award.

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Suzanne Shanahan is Associate Research Professor of Sociology and Associate Director of the Kenan Institute for Ethics. Since coming to Duke in 1999 she has served on the International Comparative Studies Board (1999-2009), the Library Council (1999-2003), Academic Council (2001-2003), Graduate Judicial Board (2008-2009), Human Rights Faculty (2008-2009), Freshman Book Committee (2006-2009) and served as DUS in Sociology (2006-2008). She is outgoing Chair of the Arts & Sciences Council where she has served on the Executive Committee since 2004. In 2005 Suzanne received the Robert B. Cox Distinguished Teaching Award.

Suzanne is a founding member of the American Sociological Association's Symbolic Boundaries Network and Senior Fellow at the Geary Institute in Dublin.

Ann Brown is an Associate Professor of Medicine and Associate Vice Dean for Faculty Development. Ann received her MD from Stanford University, completed her residency in Internal Medicine at Yale, and her fellowship in Endocrinology here at Duke. Since joining the faculty in 1993, she has developed a professional interest in faculty culture, conducting research and publishing in the area of women in medicine and generational differences in academic medicine. She has also worked to support faculty health and success at Duke through her work on the Steering Committee of the Duke Women's Initiative (02-03), as member and sometimes-chair of the School of Medicine Women's Committee, as Chair of the Faculty Development Advisory Group, and as architect of the university-wide flexible work arrangements policy for faculty. Other university service has included: Academic Council 03-05 and 06-08, Clinical Sciences Faculty Council 06-08, review committee for the VP for Institutional Equity (Chair), search committees for the Dean of the School of Nursing, and Chairs of Ob/Gyn and Psychiatry, University Standing Committee on Faculty Diversity, and instructor for the Baldwin's Scholar program. Dr. Brown was awarded the 2001 NAWH award for Excellence and the 2006 Equity, Diversity and Inclusion award from the Office of Institutional Equity.

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Andrew Muir received his MD from the Duke School of Medicine and ultimately joined the Duke faculty in 2000. He is currently an Assistant Professor in the Division of Gastroenterology in the Department of Medicine. He previously served on Academic Council from 2003 until 2008. In addition to his clinical practice and leadership position as the Director of the Hepatology Program, he has had a number of roles in the education of medical students, residents, and fellows. He is the Director for the Fellowship Training Program in Gastroenterology, and he initiated a new training program this year in transplant hepatology. Andrew's research interests include the study of health disparities in hepatitis C and liver cancer.

Garnett Kelsoe joined the Duke faculty in 1998 and is the James B. Duke Professor of Immunology (2001). Garnett is Associate Director of Duke's Center for AIDS Vaccine Development (2006) and a Senior Fellow in the Duke Center for the Study of Aging and Human Development (1999). He sits on the Chancellor's Science Advisory Council (2006), the Medical Center APT Committee for Basic Sciences (2001), is a first-year course director for the School of Medicine (2008), has served as DGS for Immunology (1999-2006), and chaired the Duke Medical Center's Basic Sciences Faculty Steering Committee (1999-2003, 2005-2007). He was first elected to Academic Council in 2005 and has served on the Hearing Committee since 2006. In addition, Kelsoe has served on external advisory boards to the National Institutes of Health (1991, 1994, 1998, 2002), the Santa Fe Institute (2001-2006), the University of Pennsylvania (1998), the University of Toronto (2004), and is a member of the Executive Board of Dedman College, Southern Methodist University (2003). From 1997-2002 he was deputy editor of *The Journal of Immunology* and is a member of the editorial board for *BioMed Central Immunology*.

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Marie Lynn Miranda is an Associate Professor in the Nicholas School of the Environment and the Department of Pediatrics and is a faculty member in the Integrated Toxicology and Environmental Health Program. Her research focuses on using state of the art understanding of the natural sciences to build better social science models and analysis. She directs the Children's Environmental Health Initiative (CEHI) at Duke, which is a research, education, and outreach program committed to fostering environments where all children can prosper. CEHI emphasizes the environmental health sciences and social justice components of risks borne by children in the United States and internationally. Her interdisciplinary approach has provided her with exposure to faculty and programs across the university. Marie Lynn has served on numerous university committees including Academic Council, the Provost's Task Force on Faculty Diversity, the DukeEngage Board of Directors, the Campus Culture Initiative, the Oversight Committee for the Durham Health Innovations Program, and the Executive Committee of the Duke Global Health Institute. She has also twice chaired the Nicholas School Faculty Council. In 1998, Marie Lynn received the Richard K. Lublin Award for Teaching. She has an active research portfolio, with funding from the USEPA, NIH, CDC, the National Association of Chronic Disease Directors, the USDA, the State of North Carolina, the Mary Duke Biddle Foundation, and The Duke Endowment. She received the USEPA Environmental Justice Achievement Award in 2008.
